HOGWEED AT WEST SHORE MINIATURE RAILWAY TRACK.

Peter has informed me that Hogweed has been identified at the track and members should be aware of this plant. Please look at the photo to make yourselves familiar with it. There is a giant version in this world of ours, but I'm sure ours is the native Hogweed.



We should be aware that the sap in the plant could cause burns to the skin and if later allowed to be exposed to sunshine these burns could get more serious. Also keep it well clear from your eyes. If there is a need to handle this plant, wear personal protective equipment in the form of protective gloves and goggles to protect your eyes.


5-inch GAUGE QUARRY HUNSLET ON EBAY.

SNOWDON MOUNTAIN RAILWAY HYBRIDS HALTED.

I've just read an article in this month's Railway Magazine saying both the Clayton hybrid locos on the SMR will not be put in service. Having been ordered in 2019, these locos employed electric motors powered by both diesel generator and traction batteries, traction and braking was by a pinion connected to the Abt rack system. These carried the names and numbers, - 14 GLASLYN and 15 MOEL EILIO.

I don't have the working weight of these locos but they were much heavier than the steam locos. I've often wondered if the viaduct at the start of the climb in Llanberis had been proof loaded to take these latest locos.

Previously in 1995, the SMR introduced three diesel electric railcars, these could be used singly or coupled together as required. Following various problems these were withdrawn in 2001 and finally scrapped in 2010. I don't know if we have any members who know more about these decisions. It would be quite interesting to know as to why these locos aren't going into service. (No pressure!!)

LLANBERIS LAKE RAILWAY.

For anyone familiar with the lake railway, long time engine driver Hefin Owen has retired after 44 years. His father worked on the locos in Dinorwig Quarry, then joined the lake railway when the quarry closed. Between the both of them they must have had between eighty- and ninety-years' experience. Whilst I was employed by National Grid, if we had any cable cooling problems on the Dinorwig cables, one of the cable cooling stations was located half way along Llyn Padarn, no access by road vehicles, only narrow-gauge railway. I've travelled in the cab of various Hunslets with Hefin at the helm many times. Initially I was very worried regarding the boiler pressure, sometimes 15 – 20 psi, (would we get home after our work?). No problems, these little locos are very forgiving.

2022 AGM. First of all, I wish to thank all the members that made the effort to attend. Frank had made it clear it was time for new blood in the Secretary's post, everyone agreed he'd done a brilliant job over the years and yes, we have a new secretary, Tony Graham has volunteered to take on the post and I wish him luck. Thanks Frank and Tony.

For anyone who thinks battery/electric locomotives are maintenance free, think again. Frank has been busy applying his electronic wizardry on Archie's Class 86 and also on both of our club locos. This was very much appreciated by everyone-Thanks Frank.

Martin our boiler inspector is also busy conducting boiler tests. During a test on Archie's Terrier a fault was detected on the regulator located under the dome. This is the disc type regulator and depends on spring pressure on the disc to keep it steam tight. Martin has investigated this problem and has come up with a solution (hopefully!) Again, these are benefits of being a member of a society and being able to share your problems with other members.

As regards my 9F, I've managed to remove the offending banjo fitting from the boiler. In 3½ inch gauge everything is rather tight so to work on this, required axles 3,4 and 5 being dropped. The thread on the boiler was re tapped ½ x 40 to ensure there was no damage. I've replaced the banjo fitting with an elbow. To enable me to screw the elbow into the boiler I've had to modify the mainframes slightly. I was ably helped by Jim and Keith during this operation, as can be seen from the photo, they both found it rather "hair raising". (It was the wind......honest!)



I'm reliably informed that we have two new members. Apologies to the person from Llanrug who I haven't met and so I don't know his name. The other person comes from Penrhyn Bay and if my memory is correct his name is David Jones, he has a rather nice GWR Pansy.

The defibrillator has again been used in an emergency. Hopefully we've helped to save another life. A sign has been fitted on the wall adjacent to the defib cabinet showing that Friends of West Shore, West Shore Café and our society have donated to this effort. It also mentions that the donations were in memory of one of the Friends of West Shore and our good friend, Past Chairman – Bob Hughes. As a member of the Rotarians, Bob was the instigator for getting many defibrillators located in various parts of Prestatyn. Not a bad legacy!!!
