West Shore Issues.

As I write this issue of our newsletter, many people throughout the country are preparing for both the London and Manchester Marathons. We as members of our society have been involved in a marathon (with Conwy Council).

Our lease for the track is due to come to an end soon. Having started talking with members of the council for a renewal quite a while back, things then went quiet, causing uncertainty for all of us.

Recently, things have started to move and there is light at the end of the tunnel. There are a few technicalities to be resolved involving a public footpath at the rear of the containers. The other point which will cost us quite a bit of extra expense is the public liability insurance. At the moment we are covered for £5 million, the council require this to be covered up to £10 million. All in all, the cost of our new lease will increase dramatically including this insurance premium.

To keep our heads above water, we as a society will be wholly dependent on public running revenue. Annual subscriptions alone will not cover this. This will mean active members running our miniature railway.

I think I have mentioned this once or twice before, it's the usual few that turn up every week! It would be brilliant to see some new faces once in a while.

Having established our new clubhouse, we required a water supply and a new electricity supply cable. A few weeks ago, Gary our Vice Chairman set work armed with a mini digger excavating a trench across the site to facilitate the cable and water supply.

When excavating anywhere, it's so important to refer to up to date records showing locations of all buried services on site. This was done, and a scope of work produced so all members involved with the working party knew what was the plan of attack.

This work has now been completed efficiently (and safely). The final task is to modify the site master drawing showing the locations of the new additional services.

Re instating the cable trench to original condition making sure there were no sharp stones that could damage the cable present. As you can see this area was very sandy. In other areas, we purchased sand to give the cable and water pipe a soft bedding.
