


Jim Payne enjoying himself. This larger "0" gauge layout had a coaling tower and ash plant as part of the shed area.

AMADEAL'S LATEST LATHE OFFER.

I must confess I've never used a lathe for screw cutting. Any threads I've ever required have been cut using taps and dies.

In the October edition of ME&W, the latest offering by tool supplier Amadeal was AMAB210E.A lathe fitted with an electronic lead screw.

This caused quite a bit of discussion at the clubhouse. At £1925:00p it's reasonably priced. If a member was thinking of purchasing a new lathe today, would be go for this model?

The distance between centres is 400m/m. Maximum dia.

Swing above the lathe bed: 210m/m. Spindle bore 38m/m.

Taper of spindle bore: MT5.

Conclusion (In ME&W). All in all the machine performed well straight out of the crate with only a minor adjustment required and should be up to the job of model engineering, and other such hobbies.

The ELS (electronic lead screw) is a very impressive feature that will simplify screw cutting for any beginner, particularly those who have little or no prior knowledge of lathe use.

Is the ELS more things to go wrong with your machine? Is a second hand Myford or Boxford a better buy knowing what prices are being asked for these machines today?
